HOW MANY SEWING MACHINGS DO YOU OWN?

Telling a tale on myself

Earlier in September I was contacted by the son of a member at Pacific Flyway. He asked me if I would contact Beth Ward regarding a Serger sewing machine she had that his mother had left with her. It seems the machine belonged to Pacific and they were wanting to sell it. I in turn contacted Arlene to find out about if she knew anything about it. Thankfully she did and she told me she would find out how much they were wanting for the Serger. Arlene got back with me and told me what they wanted for the Serger. I then called Beth and told her, it seems she had someone who was looking for another Serger as the one she had was to the point where it couldn't be repaired.

The price was agreeable and I picked up the money from Beth. I then let Arlene know the machine was purchased and how do I get this money to the guild. Arlene was so pleased and said, so you bought the Serger. Ah, no I didn't, I have one. At that point I stopped and counted what I have and here's my response.

"Gads, I just counted my machines and I have six.

- 1) My original Singer Golden Touch and Sew, in the cabinet stored in my shed. I bought it when my daughters were little, so it's over 50 years old.
- 2) An embroidery machine a friend gave me and I used like twice. My bad.
- 3) A Baby Lock Serger that my friend Sandy owned and couldn't get it to work. After she passed away her daughter gave it to me. I took it and had it cleaned, and it works like a dream. Other than I need to replace the thread. It has the original thread on the machine and it's fraying. Oh, and that thread and machine are about 21 years old – and My bad again, as I haven't used it.
- 4) A Featherweight that I bought from a neighbor for \$100. I've had it cleaned, and updated with LED lights, replaced belts and the power cord and foot cord. Yeah, and it sits in the case. My bad for the third time.
- 5) My Singer that I bought about 10 years ago. It was their centennial Black machine. I used it until I wanted a machine that was lighter weight, and I could take to classes and retreats. I suppose My bad for the fourth time.
- 6) The lighter weight machine is my Janome. And I use it almost daily.

Happenings at Springer Run

Getting to a fairground to judge quilts should be easy, right? Well, this journey was anything but.

This summer I was hired to judge the quilts for the Plumas Sierra Fair in Quincy. Sure! I hadn't been to Quincy so I figured it would be fun. Glory Hallelujah and I took off at six in the morning to get there by nine to start judging. It was a beautiful day with a bright blue sky and you could see for miles. This is an important point for this part of the story.

After turning off Hwy 99 at the Oroville exit, I'm driving up the road enjoying myself and I see a little white car pull out to cross the road in front of me. The problem? He stops full on in my lane and he stays there! I'm slamming on the brakes and turning to the right to go into the ditch. I figured it would be better than hitting him.
