



Polio update for October 24, 2025

2 NEW CASES OF WILD POLIO (WPV1) WAS REPORTED THIS WEEK, ONCE AGAIN IN AFGHANISTAN. SO THE WILD COUNT INCREASES YEAR-TO-DATE TO 38, (9 IN AFGHANISTAN AND 29 IN PAKISTAN). THERE WERE ALSO 11 POSITIVE ENVIRONMENTAL SAMPLES REPORTED (ES) OF WPV1; ALSO FROM AFGHANISTAN

Dates of the most recent wild poliovirus cases:

Afghanistan: 10/3/25 Pakistan: 08/30/25

In our other battlefield against polio, the Circulating Variant Poliovirus (cVDPV2), there were 2 new cases this last week as follows:

- PAPUA NEW GUINEA: 2 Type 2 cases (3 cases Y-T-D) (No cases reported in 2024).

The 11 positive environmental samples of WPV1 mentioned above bring the 2025 total to 548 samples Y-T-D. Last year's total was 769.

There were no positive ES of the cVDPV, variant, so the total remains at 182. For comparison purposes, the total in 2024 was 292.
